Coat of Arms

The Coat of Arms of the National Society shall consist of a simple shield, divided diagonally, left to right, surrounded by two ribbons, the upper ribbon bearing the words NATIONAL SOCIETY and the date, 1962, the lower ribbon bearing the words SOUTHERN DAMES OF AMERICA. The divided shield shall be in two colors, white and gold with surrounding ribbon in blue and white. The gold represents richness of heritage; the white represents the purity of purpose. The blue of the scroll symbolizes loyalty - to the Organization and to the Country.
